Primary Objectives

16b. Identifies letter-sound correspondences

Why It's Important

Using art is a great way to help your child learn and become more familiar with the letters in the alphabet.

Materials

Pictures cut out from magazines to represent letters in the alphabet; large piece of paper; markers; glue

What You Do

- 1. Look through magazines and collect pictures that begin with clear letter sounds. Include the first letter in your child's name as well as a few other letters.
- 2. Invite your child to sort the pictures and group them by their beginning sounds. Prompt her to talk about other words that begin with the same letter sound. *Muffin, milk, and mountain all begin with the letter M. What other words do you know that start with the /m/ sound?*
- 3. Print each beginning letter on a large piece of paper and ask your child to glue the pictures onto the paper.
- 4. Label the pictures on the paper. As you write the words, help her notice the sounds heard in each word. Here is a picture of a mitten. What sounds do you hear when I say mitten?
- 5. Hang the finished posters so that your child can share them with others.
