or the second year running, The Bear is in the running for All-Iowa News Team status.

After earning the designation from the Iowa High School Press Association for 2023, the staff members set out to prove themselves once more, putting their noses to the grindstone for volume 27. Over the seven issues that make up a year's worth of the journalism program, the students set out to produce high quality, awardwinning stories, page designs, photographs, and graphics.

These efforts were not in vain.

The Iowa High School Press Association (IHSPA) announced the paper's finalist status to Adviser Karina Krall after determining individual awards from the IHSPA spring journalism contest. In total, the paper

earned 25 individual awards in Class A, including five first place awards, seven second place awards, seven third place awards, and six honorable mentions.

Head Editor-in-Chief Olivia Naber reflected on The Bear's continued success and the work that was put in to better the West Branch journalism program

"I'm completely over the moon that The Bear has racked up even more awards this year," Naber said. "It's a testament to our staff's hard work over the past couple of years, and I'm so proud of each and every one of them.'

PIERCE BREAKS SHOT PUT RECORD

Junior Alyssa Pierce broke the WBHS shot put record that was previously 38'11" and held by Shannon Laing. Pierce threw a 39'5" on April 13 at Iowa City West and then later broke her own record on April 23 at Cedar Rapids Xavier with a 40'0" throw. This gave her a bid for Drake to compete with the top 24 throwers in the state, regardless of class.

She saw breaking the school record that was held since 2013 as a large achievement. Pierce said, "It was a very big accomplishment for me, and I knew I was very close to breaking the record. I threw a half inch off the last meet

For the Drake Relays honor, Pierce said, "To prepare, I practiced with the men's shot put because it's heavier and I also had a meet before Drake."

The extra work paid off for Pierce, and she ended up making it to finals. Pierce said, "I received ninth place, and I felt pretty good about it. It was my first time at Drake, and I placed

higher than my ranking."

The hardest part about competing for Pierce is the nerves. She "The hardest challenge for me was shaking off the nerves because competing with the top 24 is nerve racking.

Pierce will continue to challenge herself till the end of the year with hopes of making it to state. To prepare, Pierce said, "I will be using the men's shot put and keep practicing hard for the District and Conference meets to earn a spot at State."





She goes on to say, "I think I'm prepared for the rest, except the listening. I haven't heard the speaker and don't


know how fast it will be or how heavy the accent is. I'll really have to focus on words that I know



The boys and girls track teams have had a great season. Alyssa Pierce was the only person on the track team to qualify for the Drake meet. She was seeded 14th, however, she ended up placing 9th.

The girls and boys conference meet took place in Monticello, Iowa. At the conference meet Freshman, Grace Hamman broke the West Branch record for the 1500 meter, running a 4:53, breaking Lindsey Bruns' previous time.

At the conference meet Junior Alyssa Pierce placed first in shot put, throwing a 38'-9". Alyssa Pierce said, "this was a very big accomplishment for me, I had some tough competition."

Many of the girls have broken their previous records at the conference meet. Grace had two personal bests in the 1500 meter and the 800 meter. Amber Wolf had a personal best in the 400 meter hurdles. The distance medley and 4x800 meter teams also

got new personal bests.

At the conference meet, for the boys, senior Auron Marsh placed second in long jump. Senior Joe Hamman and sophomore Lincoln Naber both hit season bests in the 800 meter race. Sophomore Lynden Mac-Gillivray ran the 3200 meter race and also got a personal record.

NABER TAKES HOME MVP BLOCKING AWARDS, PLAYS HARD IN ROLLER DERBY TOURNAMENTS

long with a black eye, senior Olivia Naber, A.K.A Stitches #668, brought home the "Most Valuable Blocker" award two times in the current roller derby season.

On April 14, Naber's roller derby team, the Misfits, part of the Iowa City Bruisers roller derby league, faced off against the Sioux Falls Junior Roller Derby at the MidAmerican RecPlex in Des Moines, IA, for the Des Moines tournament. The Misfits emerged triumphant with a score of 216-172.

After the match, the Sioux Falls Junior Roller Derby selected Naber as the most valuable blocker, earning her the Most Valuable Blocker award.

Naber said, "After every game that we play in a tournament, both teams come together and vote for the most valuable blocker and the most valuable jammer from the other team. I won that during our very last game with the Sioux Falls team, which was very gratifying."

At the Des Moines tournament, the Misfits also played against the Minnesota Frostbite Roller Derby, winning with a score of 42-459, and the Des Moines Derby Brats, losing with a score

On April 27, the Misfits faced their first opponents, Wasatch Roller Derby, and won with a score of 120-228.

The next day, the Misfits faced off against the Spokane, Washington, Cherry Bomb Brawlers at the Lincoln Sports Foundation, in Lincoln, Nebraska.

The Misfits won the match with a score of 507-46. For the second time, Naber received the Most Valuable Blocker award.

Finally the team went against No Coast Junior Roller Derby. In the last few seconds of this match, a member of the No Coast Derby struck Naber in the face, leaving her with a black eye.

"That game was rough. In the last couple seconds of the last game I got whacked in the face," Naber said. "It probably would have been called out if it hadn't been the end of the game, but since it was the end, they just called it

The Misfits lost the match with a score of 300-177.

"We were hoping to pull out a win against them," Naber said, "But their program has grown a lot over the last couple years. I think they are a team that we can beat in the future, but we just have to put our nose to the grindstone and work at it.'

To open their season, The Misfits played the Des Moines Derby Brats in Cedar Rapids in January and lost with a score of 79-257.

In February, the Iowa City Bruisers also competed in a Philadelphia, Pennsylvania tournament. Conflicting schedules with the show choir season did not allow Naber to make it to these bouts.

In Philadelphia, the Misfits played against the BlackNBluegrass Junior Roller Derby, losing with a score of 187-177. Second, they played the Philly Roller Derby Juniors, losing with a score of 112-430. Lastly, they played Southside Revolution Derby, losing with a score of 117-504.

The Iowa City Bruisers will compete in Iowa City on May 18 at 1:00 p.m. at the Mercer Aquatic Center before the playoffs begin in June.
