WBHS SENDS FOUR STUDENTS TO THE SPECIAL OLYMPICS

For the first time, West Branch High School sent a Special Olympics team to compete in bowling. On Oct. 9 2025, Senior Alex Moss, juniors Connor Davidson and Brayden Depoorter, and freshman Kohry Curtis all competed.

The competition took place at the Cedar Rapids Bowling Center.

Special education teacher, Dawson Ryner said, "The atmosphere was so cool to see all the kids getting to compete, the vibes were awesome, everyone was happy for everyone." The students each bowled two games and Davidson advanced to the state competition.

State will take place on Nov. 22, 2025, at the Cedar Rapids Bowling Center. To practice, students would bowl at Colonial Lanes in Iowa City during the day with paraeducator Jodi Byrd. Ryner would also go with them. Davidson will continue to practice leading up to the state competition.

"I was not sure what to expect," Ryner stated in an interview, "it was a surprise, it kind of just made me feel like I could gasp." The Special Olympics team will be participating in the track and field competition in the spring. They will also be looking into other sports for next year.

Grace Hamann attended the 2025 Iowa High School Cross Country Championships with City High again this year as she continues to cut down her running time and out run her opponents.

On Oct. 9, Hamann earned a 5k personal record of 18:41, placing as City High's second Varsity runner and fifth overall in the MVC Super Meet held at Kickers Soccer Park in Iowa City.

With a three-year streak for appearances at state, and coming off of a successful track and field season, Hamann is no stranger to these competitive environments. She is ranked 22nd in the state for 4A as of Oct. 28.

Hamann has learned many lessons through running in cross country and track.

Hamann said, "You're never going to be able to replicate an exact race or an exact team so just be in the moment and give it your all."

Hamann, along with other West Branch students, all run with City High in a collaboration that's held fast for multiple decades.


Lynden MacGillivray, Preston Mayhew, Cash Staker, and Julian Trepanier make up the boys' Bearhawks team.

For the Fresh/Soph boys race, J Trepanier placed 202nd at 22:33.



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

Faceless eyes meet mine and I realize it is time.


The fleeting whispers of your honey-like voice

West Branch middle and high school students experienced a change in the grading system this semester in an effort to make grading more balanced. West Branch currently uses a standards-based grading system. This means students are graded based on their ability to show their skills. Before the change, an F equalled 100%

ability to show their skills. Before the change, an E equalled 100%,



an S equalled 85%, a C equalled 75%, an N equalled 65%, and an I equalled zero percent. West Branch standards grading must be converted to a percentage and letter grade for students who want to attend post-high school training or schooling.

Principal Sara Oswald said, "Building Leadership Teams have decided to implement a different calculation 'behind the scenes' in Powerschool." Now, the new grading scale is E equals four, S equals three, C equals two, N equals one, and I equals zero.

The past scale created a problem with zero as a grade because it did not accurately reflect the student's knowledge and skills of understanding. Earning an I, or a zero, means students showed no work or didn't turn anything in.

"The Case Against the Zero,"

an article shared by Oswald, claims, "People have argued that a traditional 100-point grading scale is unfair and ultimately counterproductive for students to learn."

WBHS hopes that using the 4-3-2-1-0 scale on the back end of PowerSchool will help to combat the issues with zero.

THE BEAR EARNS TOP 15 IN IOWA

The Bear Newspaper earned the honor of being in the top 15 student newspapers in Iowa. The Iowa High School Press Association runs a competition for Iowa high school news teams each spring where advisors can submit student work for awards. Then out of the top 15, five schools are picked for the All Iowa News Team, which is announced at the annual fall IHSPA conference.

The IHSPA conference is an event in which both newspaper and yearbook teams from across Iowa can attend as a way to grow as staff through breakout sessions where students can select to learn new skills.

For a school to enter the IHSPA spring journalism contests, the advisor must submit student work. The application process consists of a cost of two dollars per entry for each category you enter. There are 40 different available categories, such as art

and design, social media promotion, photography, online, and writing. Each school is allowed to enter five pieces per category. Categorical rankings are based on the school population and are sorted into three classifications: small, medium, and large.

The winning rankings are first, second, third, and honorable mention. Points are given to each school by entry per their ranking, which are then used to determine the total amount of points a school wins and its overall ranking. Every school is eligible to receive a banner if they reach the top 15 and proceed to the top five. Each school must submit three issues to be judged, and those must be mailed by the deadline of June 2. The top five schools will be picked from those submissions by a panel of judges through the IHSPA.

For the 2024-2025 school year, The Bear won 19 awards, putting them in the running for the All-Iowa News Team of the Year.

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
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

WBHS's robotics team, 5041 CyBears, competed at the second annual Clash In The Corn competition in West Des Moines on October 17 and 18 as part of the 2025 offseason for the FIRST Robotics Competition. The team welcomed several new members this season.

The team started off with technical difficulties when they first arrived at the competition and had to work to overcome them and eventually got the robot working again. Team members also attended various seminars on topics such as robot automation, control systems, and programming.

After fixing the robot, the team participated in several practice rounds in which new members got to try driving the robot around the field while learning from senior members.

During day two of the competition the team competed in qualifying matches with mixed results, winning four matches and losing five. After qualifying matches, CyBears ended up ranking ninth out of 17 teams.

During selection, alliance five team captain, 648 QC Elite Flaming Squirrels, chose Cybears and 967 Iron Lions to compete in the playoffs.

CyBears competed in three playoff matches, winning match two against alliance four 81-79, and losing matches seven and 12 to alliances one and four, resulting in the team being eliminated from playoffs.







BURNING QUESTIONS: WBHS STUDENT BOAZ SERVES AS WBFD FIRE CADET

The United States celebrated its 100th annual Fire Prevention Week from Oct. 6 to Oct. 10, 2025. The theme this year is "Charge into Safety," which aims to educate people on the fire hazards posed by batteries and other electronics.

As part of Fire Prevention Week, members of the West Branch Fire Department visited students at Hoover Elementary to teach them about fire safety.

During the visit, fire cadet Robby Boaz talked to kids about how to escape a building and demonstrated their bunker gear. Boaz has been a member of WBFD since early 2025, and he

initially joined because he wanted to serve a greater purpose in his community.

Boaz serves as a member of the fire cadet program in which high schoolers over the age of 16 can join as volunteer firefighters intraining. The various duties of cadets like him are more limited than that of more senior members.

Cadets are not allowed to enter active fires or do certain EMS jobs like administering medications, but can perform basic tasks like CPR or assist with rescues.

Boaz initially found these limitations challenging and had to work on not overstepping them.

Boaz also noted that he and many others in the firefighting profession struggle with mental health due the dangers associated with the job.

"It never gets easier," said Boaz. However, despite the challenges, Boaz enjoys many aspects of the job, the main one being a strong sense of camaraderie with other firefighters.

Boaz also said, "Several other cadets and I plan on studying fire science at DMACC and other schools in the future."

The West Branch fire cadet program teaches responsibility, gives students a greater sense of purpose and community, and allows them to be a part of something bigger than themselves.

Ultimately, Boaz said, "I would recommend that other interested students join WBFD."

UNITED STATES FACES GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN

On Wednesday, Oct 1, America faced a nationwide government shutdown that left federally funded agencies closed.

Government shutdowns occur when Congress is unable to agree on passing funding bills. Oct 1 is the day that federal funding begins. If federal funding is not available, the government shuts down.

When the government shuts down, some employees might still have to have to work but will not get paid.

Federal workers are classified essential or non-essential workers. Essential workers are required to continue working despite not being paid. Agents with the FBI, TSA, military personnel, and many more fall under the classification of essential workers.

Non-essential workers are put on unpaid furlough. Unpaid furlough means these federal workers will not be able to work and will not be paid until the shutdown ends.

There are some exceptions to this and some federal employees continue working and being paid during a shutdown.


This includes the U.S. Postal Service, members of Congress, teachers, and employees with nonappropriated funding.

Though a government shutdown may not affect you directly, some people rely on the services provided by the government. National parks and museums typically close down entirely during a government shutdown. New loan applications for small businesses, federal housing, and student aid could be put on hold. Routine inspections by the FDA could also be put on hold, leading to health risks.

Taxpayer services could be delayed. The processing of new applications and requests to programs like Social Security, Medicare, and WIC could be delayed.

Government shutdowns do not have a set date of when they end due to Congress having to agree; in the past, they have varied anywhere from five days to thirtyfive days.

The 2018-2019 shutdown lasted for 35 days. If this government shutdown continues, this could mean programs, like SNAP, funded by the government, could run out of funds
